ADOPT-A-STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

Everyone knows times are tough in Detroit. Many families who would like to send their children to Christ the King simply do not have enough money to pay the \$4,000 a year tuition. To combat this issue, the school's development committee launched an Adopt-a-Student campaign in June 2010. This program's aim is raising scholarship money for students

whose families cannot afford the tuition at Christ the King.

CHRIST THE KING SERVICE CORPS - FAITH, SERVICE, SIMPLICITY
